Community gathers for town hall forum

Several months ago, the Rothsay Area-wide Economic Development Authority held a town hall meeting to gauge public opinion on what direction community members would like to see the town take in the near future. Although attendance wasn't high, feedback was very strong on areas throughout the community that residents would like to see improvement. Topping the list was a grocery store.

The last time a full-service grocery store was open in Rothsay was in 2001 when the student-run Tiger Mart grocery was in operation. Started ten years prior in 1991 under the supervision of Tom Fosse, high school students started a corporation and applied for a grant to purchase the grocery store and stock it with groceries. The day-to-day dealings of the store ran under the guidance of an adult manager, while still being operated as a student-owned corporation. Students joined the corporation during their high school years and made decisions on how to run the store, just like any corporation. Once they graduated, they sold back their stock and relinquished their membership control to the next generation of high school students. This creative and highly-unique business model continued for a decade and kept a small-town store in operation. Looking back

on the Tiger Mart operation, it's remarkable the business venture lasted as long as it did. With constant turn-over every year with new student leadership, varied interest in store operations, little-to-no business skills, and as they say in the business world, having no real "skin in the game" – it's amazing the store stayed in business. Twenty-four years later Rothsay is still without a grocery store and now would welcome any creative and highly-unique business model again to help fill the void.

One of those creative ideas the RAEDA has been exploring for the past year-and-half has been a "self-serve" store. The Main Street Market in Evansville, MN is the rural model for how a 24/7 grocery store can operate as a self-serve operation. People access the store with an electronic key fob. The key fob, much like an all-access gym membership, is used the same way in that the member purchases a yearly membership and then has 24-hour access to the grocery store. It runs on its own most days as people scan their groceries at a kiosk and pay with a debit or credit card. On certain days of the week the store is staffed and open to the public for those who decide not to purchase a membership. The sole idea of self-serve is to save on labor costs, especially when finding help is difficult in small towns. The RAEDA is currently exploring this idea and working with potential owners to make this a reality.

Mayor's Musings

A wrap-up of my time on City Council and what I see ahead in the future

When I was first elected as Mayor, John Reber congratulated me by saying "Congratulations on achieving your lifetime goal as being Mayor of Rothay, MN!" That always struck a chord with me—specifically on how your goals, wants, desires and needs change so much in life—and quickly.

Being a City Council member or Mayor was never on my radar of things to do in life, then shortly after moving to Rothsay, getting involved in a few things and attending a handful of City Council meetings, Shane Balken approached me. He shared with me that with his business ventures growing and getting busier, he decided to not run for re-election on City Council and asked me to consider it—and I did, and I can't thank him enough for it. Almost 9 years later, I asked Shane to do the same—funny how that happens!

Accomplishments

Every year I write down a handful of goals I wanted our City to achieve or start—some of them were easy, low-hanging fruit goals—and some of them were where BHAG's (Big Hairy Audacious Goals). While all goals are never met—I believe we, as the City Council and the community of Rothsay were able to knock off some good ones, such as:

- **The old school demo and transitioning things to the Rothsay Events Center (REC)** has been an absolute win in my mind. During the school year it's used almost every single day, it's provided a ton of opportunities and events for our community.
- **New Land Purchase for Agri-Business & Commercial**—the acquisition of new land

we were able to bring into City limits has been a good thing for our future growth opportunities.

- **EDA re-org:** Having the Rothsay Area Economic Development Authority be its own, separate operating group (instead of a sub-committee of City Council) has really spawned and taken off and brought a lot of great value to our community.
- **JDA Grant for the REC**—we received a \$250,000 grant to make some much needed upgrades to the REC that will help ensure the property looks good and provide some protection to the weather elements we have
- **New events to our community**—such as the Rothsay Round-Up, Santa Days, Turkey Bingo, Lighting up the Chicken—these events bring fun and activities to our community that people look forward to every year.
- **East Park**—Many community-based upgrades to the East Park—some of the big ones include: ALL of the extra work the Lions have put into East Park and the Shelter (playground equipment, upgrades, painting and maintenance), ball field upgrades and fencing, the ice rink (we tried our best!) and more community based events that are focused there.

What I enjoyed the most (and will probably miss the most)

The relationships built with the City Staff and community members are things I will remember fondly when I reflect on my time as Mayor. There are a lot of people that really love this community and want to do things to make it better. When people get together and

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




214 1st avenue house for sale

The Rothsay Area Economic Development Authority recently finished a complete remodel on the home at 214 1st Avenue NW, and if you are looking to make Rothsay your home – you need to see this house! This 2,900+ square foot house was built circa 1907 just as Rothsay was booming with new houses and business around town. Originally owned by Johan and Betsey Bakken, the beautiful old house was later owned by Wilie and Gilma Sundby, and for many years by Bill and Barb Nitz, just to name a few. A fire destroyed a portion of the house eight years ago and until recently, sat empty and needing major repair.

At the start of 2024, the RAEDA purchased the house and with the help of the Southern Valley Economic Development Authority and the Richland-Wilkin Joint Powers Authority, the RAEDA renovated the house into a beautiful three bedroom, two bathroom, modern house while keeping the charm from 100+ years ago. The two-story home has been completely remodeled, providing all of the comforts of new construction, while keeping the same characteristics and style of an original turn-of-

the-century home. The main level features a living room, 3/4 bath, dining and kitchen with all new stainless steel appliances. The second level provides three bedrooms and a full bath. The full bath has washer and dryer hookups. The closets have plenty of room. The basement is not finished but does have roughed-in plumbing to add a third bathroom. The front porch is a great place to read the paper, drink coffee or just enjoy the sunshine. This property has a single stall garage that is 12' by 20'. You'll also love the big backyard which has room for an additional garage. This home was totally refinished, updates are too numerous to name, but include plumbing, electrical, high-efficiency furnace & central air, heat pump, new flooring, countertops, water softener, water heater, etc. This home qualifies for a three-year city tax abatement rebate program. Teacher Talk: Paton continues education excellence

If there was a “Mount Rushmore” for Rothsay High School teachers, Royce Paton would certainly be one of the teachers etched in stone. With nearly 55 years of teaching in the Rothsay High School system, Royce’s legacy has been carved in granite for her dedication to teaching and nurturing generations of RHS graduates.

A native of Neche, North Dakota, Royce started her career in Rothsay immediately after graduating from North Dakota State University in 1971 with a degree in Special Education and Mathematics. “I interviewed with Gerhard Dammel, the superintendent at the time, and Doug Lindberg was one of the first people to show me around the school.” Throughout her time in Rothsay, it might be safe to say most RHS graduates took at least some form of mathematics class from Royce, if not several classes. Royce taught full-time until her retirement in 2005. But retirement didn’t last long. Royce came back to Rothsay High School almost immediately as a substitute teacher and has been working for the school district every year for at least 50-60 days a year on average. During 2010, 2011, and 2013 school years, Royce was a long-time substitute teacher, working the full school years.

Asked what’s changed the most during her time in teaching, Royce said she didn’t think there has been major changes in the students. “I think the kids are just as good

as there were in the ‘70s, but there is a lot less smoking and drinking. It’s not an issue as far as misbehavior — it’s just not there. If behavior was an issue, I wouldn’t have continued substitute teaching for as long as I have.” Another small but notable change Royce added was that homework has changed over the years for students. “We used to have more homework. Now it’s almost not even a word anymore. Students have more time to get their work finished during school.”

During her active years of teaching, Royce served in several other capacities in addition to teaching, most notably coaching and athletic director. Royce said one of her funniest memories of coaching didn’t come on the volleyball court but instead, when she was working the clock for a boys’



basketball game. “Bill Rose was coaching a boy’s game and Collin Carlsrud twisted his ankle on the court. Collin was quite a comedian and when Bill went out to check on him, Collin asked Bill ‘How’s the crowd taking it?’” Royce added that one of her best coaching memories was winning her first district volleyball championship in 1975. Rothsay would go on to win four volleyball district titles in a row from 1975 – 1978 under Royce’s leadership. During her time as the Volleyball Coach, Royce’s accolades included four district championships, 15 conference championships, 324 volleyball victories, and District Volleyball Coach of the Year in 1996 – just to name a few.

When asked what her best memories of being at Rothsay High School are, Royce said not only teaching, but the friendships of teachers she has made throughout the years; and the unique opportunity to teach children of former students, and now even their grandchildren. And she added, “watching students go on to succeed in their careers.” Royce’s dedication to Rothsay has been felt

by several generations of students. One of those former students, Anita (Follingstad) Heier, is currently the math teacher and head girls’ basketball coach at Rothsay High School. Heier said Royce made a tremendous impact on her growing up. “Royce Paton holds everyone to a high standard both in the classroom and on the court. She cares about each student as an individual and pushes everyone to reach their maximum potential. She was a great role model as an educator and a coach. Royce was the reason I chose to pursue teaching and coaching, and she continues to be a great mentor today,” said Heier.

During her 54 years of teaching at RHS, Royce said she has worked with 16 superintendents and 15 principals. Combine this with all the changes of administration, school board members, teachers and hundreds and hundreds of students that have passed through the doors of RHS, and it’s clear to see the huge impact Royce has made on Rothsay High School. And how long can we expect Royce to stay? “As long as the kids behave themselves, I’ll keep going.” ♦

Once a Bison, always a Bison. In addition to coaching for more than 30 years, Royce Paton was also a standout athlete during her collegiate career at North Dakota State University. She was a four-sport athlete, competing in volleyball, basketball, badminton, and bowling. She was the captain of the women’s volleyball and basketball teams her senior year in 1970-1971, and earned the Most Valuable Player award for both sports.

work towards a goal to move a cause forward, fix an issue, or just simply trying to make Rothsay a better place—it's a ton of fun and is a good definition of great community to be part of.


Future prospects

- Prairie Addition lots have been sold to a contractor and they are open to discussions on new homes!
- We will soon have 4 homes in town that have been un-livable in the past, fully remodeled and ready for new families to our community (211 1st AVE NW, 214 1st AVE NW, 221 1st St NW; and 153 Center St S)! And three of those homes were able to leverage funds through a regional Economic Development program (RW-JPA).

If we use what we've learned over these last few years—from these successes, I am confident we can continue bringing new business and home prospects to Rothay—new families, new jobs, more opportunity! ♦

Second on the list of improvements in town was housing. Not surprising, this has been a topic of many conversations during the past few years as residents have talked about more options to increase the population and bring new families to town. The city recently passed a tax abatement for new home builds and major home remodels. For the first three years after the new home is built (or qualified home remodels), the property will have its city taxes abated. The hope is this will help entice home builders and home buyers to invest into the community. Recently three major home remodels have taken place through the help of the Richland-Wilkin Joint Powers Authority. One house was remodeled and sold (211 1st Ave NW). Another has been remodeled and is currently for sale (214 1st Ave NW). And the third is currently being remodeled and will eventually be available for sale (153 Center Street N.). All three of

these houses were blighted and in dire need of major repairs. All three houses will qualify for three-year tax abatements for the new homeowners.

Another improvement residents mentioned is curbside garbage recycling. This is currently not an option for garbage pick-up, but the city has started to explore more options for recycling in town. The city's garbage contract is coming up for renewal this year. Fuchs Sanitation currently has the city garbage contract and has had the garbage contract for many years in Rothsay. At this time, if residents want to recycle there are recycling bins located near the railroad tracks for glass, plastic, newspaper, and aluminum. A separate cardboard dumpster is located at the Rothsay Truck Stop. Is this enough for recycling in town for residents? Or would you like to see more options for recycling? Tell us your thoughts on curbside recycling and if this is a program you think is worth exploring for the city of Rothsay. ♦
